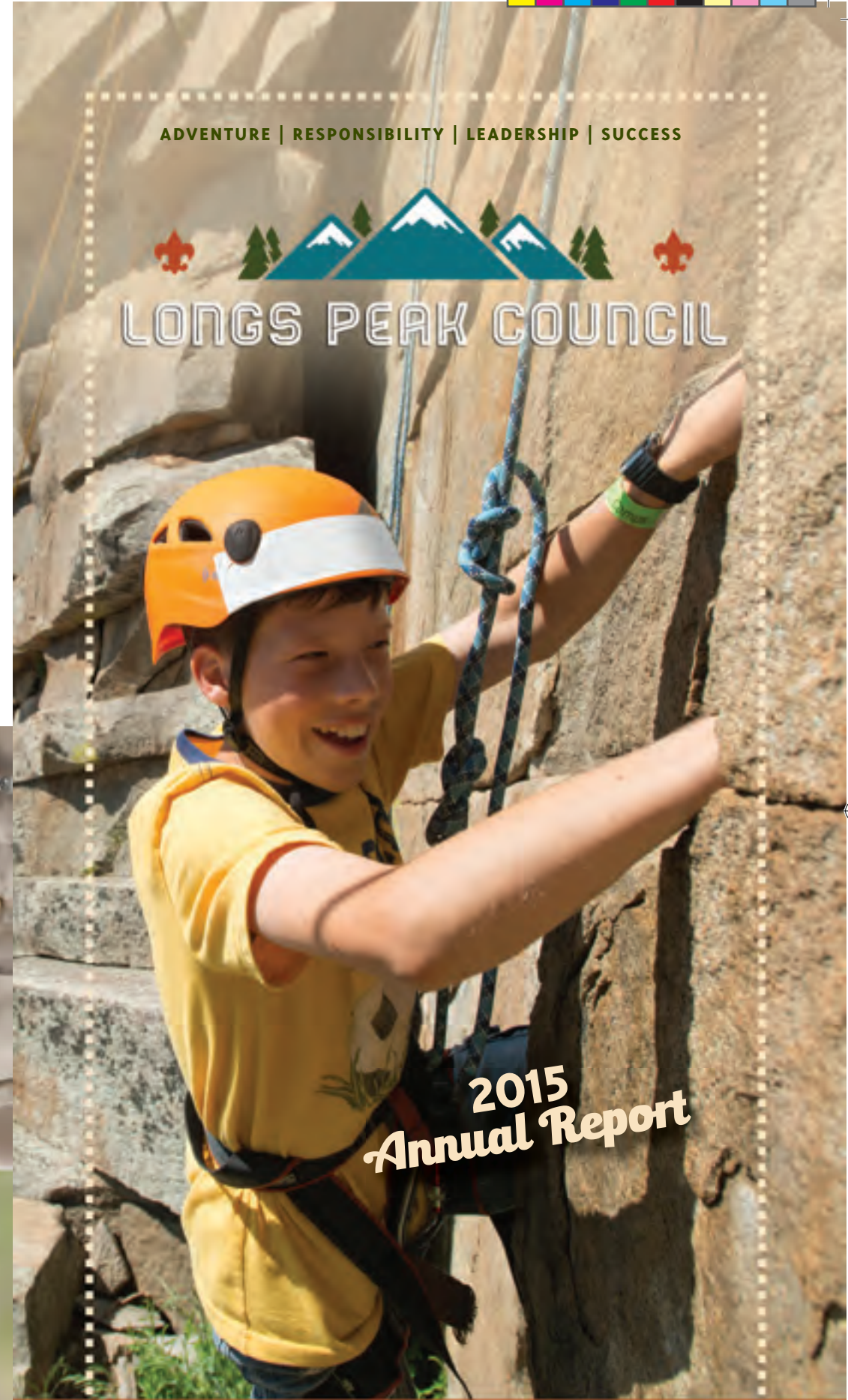

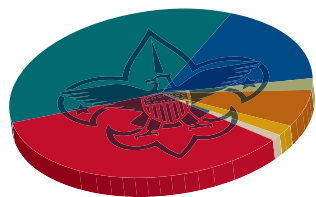

Revenue and Expenses

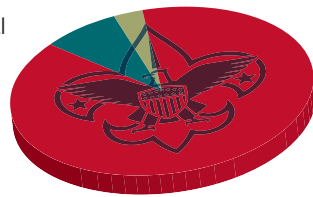
How we are funded

How we invest in youth

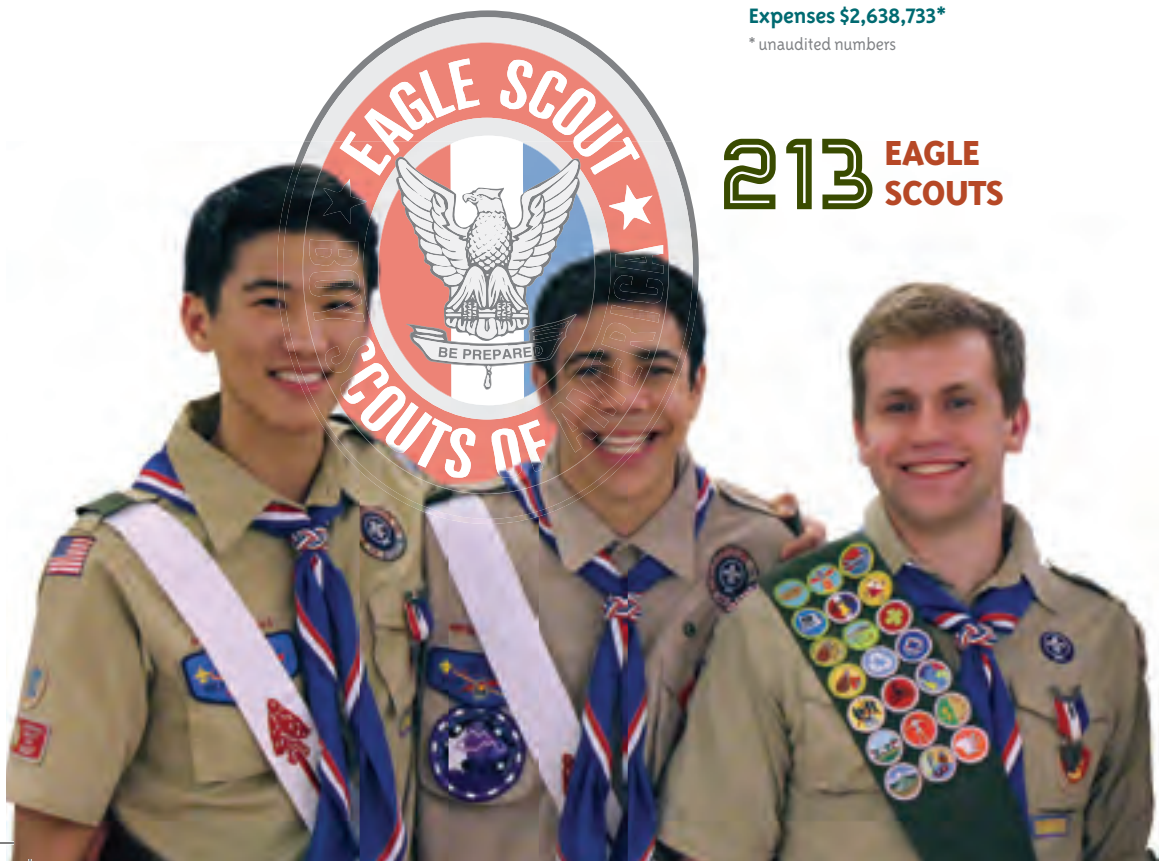

Youth Programs

Cub Scouting is a family and home centered program for boys in first through fifth grades. Cub Scouting's emphasis is on quality, age-appropriate programs delivered at the neighborhood level.

Boy Scouting is a program for boys ages 11 to 17 and designed to achieve the aims of Scouting through a vigorous outdoor program and peer-group leadership that builds character, independence, and values in young people.

Varsity Scouting is a program for boys 14-18 and offers the same ideals, principles and advancement as Boy Scouting. However, Varsity's flexibility allows community organizations to design a program to fit its own needs.

Venturing is a co-ed program for young men and women ages 13 to 20. It includes challenging, high-adventure activities giving teenagers an opportunity to learn and grow in a fun, supportive environment.

Learning for Life is a co-ed, school-based program for youth in grades K through 12. Our Outdoor Education program brings students outdoors to experience personal growth and learn about the world around them.

Exploring is a division of Learning for Life that offers co-ed programs for teenagers focused on learning about specific career interests by mentoring with local businesses, professionals, and industry leaders.

Multicultural Scouting programs are offered to youth regardless of their circumstances, neighborhood or ethnic background. Youth in urban neighborhoods are often faced with many challenges, as they live in fragile families and disintegrating neighborhoods.

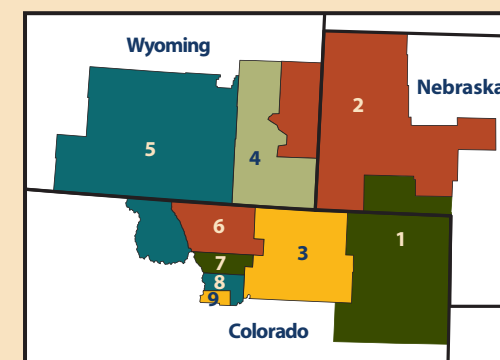
Area Served
